

UNI RECIPIENT OF WONDERFUL ALUMNUS GENEROSITY

Alumnae and alumni are women and men who have been reared or nourished by their alma mater, their "nourishing mother." Alumnus, alumna, and alma are all derived from the Latin verb alere, "to nourish." A Benefactor is one who confers a benefit or benefits.

Since the publication of last year's UHEF Newsletter Charles Brewer Fiscus, Class of 1944, quietly became the leading benefactor of his Alma Mater, University High School. He first transferred \$25,000 in securities to the UHEF in 2001. That donation enabled the UHEF to make \$200 available to each of Uni's teachers to supplement the budget allocated for their instructional programs. In December 2005 he sent us an additional \$25,000, and then again in May 2006, \$25,000 more. This amazing gentleman has taken Uni under his wing, and next year the UHEF Board and administration and staff will determine how best to utilize these funds for the benefit of University High School.

Charles was raised in the Sawtelle area, and attended Brockton Elementary and Emerson Jr. High School. At a very early age, Charles learned construction by working side by side with his dad as they built several apartment houses, and later, Charles would strike out on his own and build a series of apartment houses in the West Los Angeles area.

During his days at Uni, Charles worked the night shift at Douglas Aircraft so had little time for after school activities. Since free time was scarce, the raucous Saturday afternoon matinees at the old Tivoli Theater on Santa Monica Blvd. are some of Charles' fondest memories.

Like many during this period, Charles, after graduating in 1944, had to put his life on hold when he entered military service. During World War II he served in the South Pacific, the Philippine campaign, and later as part of the American forces that occupied post-war Japan. Returning home after the war, he finally had a chance to complete his education and earned a degree that opened the way for his career as a journeyman teacher. From being a grammar school teacher in the small community of Lone Pine, California, to teaching Industrial Arts in Culver City, Charles was a firm believer in the educational process as part of the key to a successful life. Another degree from a small college gave Charles the opportunity to be employed for ten years by the City of Los Angeles as a draftsman. Today, Charles is retired and lives modestly in the Westwood area. Fascinated by the history of Los Angeles, he especially enjoys researching the urban rail and streetcar history of the city. Mr. Fiscus is not only a champion of Uni, but also an active member of the Veterans Park Conservancy, an organization attempting to save at least part of the Sawtelle facility from commercial development.

With Charles' generous contributions, and with the continuing contributions from many other alumni, the Foundation will be able to continue its mission to supplement funding for the instructional program. Not all of us have the funds to duplicate Charlie's generosity, but all donations, large and small will help Uni Hi continue to succeed. We are asking all of you to join Charles in supporting the efforts of the University High School Educational Foundation.

After a farewell to nine retiring teachers, and as a result of several transfers, Uni started the year with 17 new teachers. Our new staff brought an energy that they shared with our students who excelled in academics, athletics, and other extra-curricular activities. Our Boys' Tennis team won the Invitational City Championship, and our Girls' Basketball Team was runner-up in the City Championship. Football, Girls' Soccer, and Baseball all went to the semi-final rounds before being eliminated. Two track team members competed in the State Finals.

Academically, Uni was most improved in our local LAUSD district in the yearly Academic Decathlon. Three students medaled in Mathematics and English. Our API (Academic Performance Index) score went up 16 points from the previous year and 88% of our students have passed the high school exit exam as of the writing of this article.

The Jazz Ensemble continues to be the highlight of the Great Taste of Brentwood celebration each year, and have established a new Uni tradition: performing at the Santa Monica Pier once a year. With the addition of the 12 electronic keyboards donated by United Talent Agency the music department now has a complete keyboard lab.

This year's Career Day exceeded our expectations as we hosted 38 speakers representing a myriad of careers. Thanks to the help of UTA our special guest was actor Jerry O'Connell from the hit television show "Crossing Jordan." Many of the speakers were Uni alumni who expressed how pleasant it was to return to Uni and share their student experiences. Please consider joining us for Career Day next year.

We end the year in gratitude to the Uni High Education Foundation for the generous support you have provided for our instructional program.

UNITED TALENT AGENCY'S PARTNERSHIP WITH UNI HIGH

United Talent Agency (UTA) is one of the entertainment industry's premiere talent and literary agencies. Based in Beverly Hills, UTA is a full-service firm representing many of the most widely-known figures in the motion picture, television, publishing and music fields, including top actors, directors, writers and producers.

UTA adopted University High School in 2004 to help boost Uni's arts and literary programs, as well as implement programming that will positively impact the students at Uni.

New this year was the creation of the UTA Arts Grant Program that granted \$20,000 for Uni High arts and literary programming. Each Fall student and teacher teams will be able to apply together for a grant, in which top applicants will then make a presentation to the UTA Grants Committee composed of UTA agents. In 2005, five grant recipients were selected and the funds were used to enhance the animation, dance, music, and literary arts departments, as well as purchase equipment.

The UTA Mentoring Program just completed its inaugural year, working with sixteen Uni High school juniors who participated in a monthly workplace-mentoring program where they were paired with an agent at UTA. Mentors helped to guide mentees with academic achievement, college preparation, and resume and interviewing techniques. In addition, two graduating seniors will participate in the UTA Summer Internship program before they head off to college in the fall.

Through the partnership, UTA was able to touch many additional students at University High and help enrich Uni's academic environment. More than 25 classes throughout the year participated in seminars led by professionals ranging from actors, animators, composers, historians, and writers. Many professionals also participated in Uni High's Career Day in March.

UTA is proud to support and partner with University High School to enhance its academic and arts education.

STUDENTS "TAKE A STAND" AT UNI HISTORY DAY

History Day is a national competition that began approximately thirty years ago to promote academic achievement, especially historical thinking and research skills, in grades 4-12. Projects must follow rigorous National History Day guidelines, and connect to the theme, which was "Taking a Stand in History" this year. Uni High History Day winners can go on to compete at the County, State, and National levels, but the greatest reward is the knowledge and experience gained from researching, analyzing, and preparing an entry.

The Third Annual Uni History Day was the most successful yet. Student participation more than doubled over the past three years, from 170 in 2004 to over 350 students in 2006. Participating teachers Paula Waxman, Deborah Robbins, Richard Takagaki, Kyle Laughlin, and Mark Rhomberg are particularly proud of the five Uni projects that placed in four of the five project categories at the 2006 LA County History Day on March 25, 2006. Group Exhibit: "Simon Wiesenthal" by Casmir Jordan, Kimberly Pablo, and Marissa Cohnen; Individual Performance: "Nelson Mandela" by Kokeb Shiferraw; Individual Website: "Battle of Britain" by Peter Elliott; Group Website: "Chinese Foot binding" by Chaleena Ukositkul and Juliana Mendez; and Historical Paper: "Striking the Lowell Mill" by Alexandra Rodgers.

The Fourth Annual Uni History Day, "Triumph and Tragedy in History," will be held on December 6 and 7, 2006. It will build on past successes, including increasing the number and the excellence of the entries. As the number of entries increases, so does the need for judges. The judging process consists of groups of three judges who interview students and complete a judging form. Judges for the past three years have included current and retired Uni faculty and administrators, Uni Alumni, representatives from UTA, parents of current students, and graduate students from the UCLA History Department. A deep knowledge of history is not required; students will teach you! The Uni Hi Foundation is sad to share news of the passing of one of its Founding Fathers, Stan Stoner. Most of you knew Stan as the voice on the other end of the phone in the Alumni Office at Uni from 1985 to 2000. He and fellow Vagabond Ruthella Gibbon staffed the office every Monday for many years, and they established the foundation of the Uni High alumni data-base.

Stan is remembered by the Uni family for his hospitality and true loyalty to his school. He came to the Alumni Office on Monday mornings, put up a pot of coffee, put out a tray of cookies and opened the door to any faculty and alumni who dropped by. He happily engaged in long discussions with alumni who were organizing class reunions and did all he could to facilitate those contacts. For many years the annual All-Alumni Picnic was held in May, but the date could never conflict with the opening day of Fishing Season, which Stan traveled to for most of his life.

His daughter Barbara reported that Stan purchased a two-wheel bicycle in September, for exercise, but fractured his hip in a fall shortly thereafter. He made a quick recovery, and was back to himself in short order. He fell ill in April and passed away on May 19. He is survived by his daughter and wife Louella.

TWO OF OUR OWN HOPE HAMBY YOUNG AND BRUCE YOUNG CLASS OF 1942

(This is the 3rd in the series "One of Our Own. Warren wrote it following interviews with Hope in May 2006)

In the 1930's, the Westside of Los Angeles was still predominantly rural. The rolling hills south of Westwood were dotted with groves of eucalyptus, and family farms. Homes were scattered across the area in newly developing tracts. Crops of corn, celery, lima beans, and melons flourished between Overland and Sepulveda, and stretched south to Playa del Rey, and north to Sawtelle and Santa Monica Blvd.

Hope Hamby was born in Los Angeles, and was raised in the Palms area. There were plenty of vacant lots to play in, and sidewalks were few and far between so every inch of cement was used for roller-skating. Hope also had a horse that she kept at a nearby stable, as there was plenty of empty land for riding. Bruce Young was five when his family moved into Westwood just north of Pico Blvd. Bruce loved sports of all kinds, enjoyed long bike rides to the beach with his friends, and was a dedicated Boy Scout.

Hope went to Overland Avenue School, and then on to Emerson, and in September of 1939, enrolled at University High School. The war that had just broken out in Europe seemed distant and had little impact on American life. Although both Bruce and Hope had attended Emerson at the same time, they didn't meet until they were students at Uni and members of a church youth group. They started dating and were soon "going steady."

High school life was idyllic. Both enjoyed Uni, and many of the student activities. Bruce had excellent grades and played varsity football. Hope's classes in math, home economics, and physical education were her favorites. It was her love of sports that would lead her into her career as a physical therapist. The Ocean Park Amusement Pier, the beach, and Crumplar's in Westwood (thirty cents would get you the best malt in town) were the favorite hangouts for Hope, Bruce, and their close friends.

Friday, December 5th 1941 was an ordinary school day, but after the Sunday attack on Pearl Harbor the lives of every American changed. Classes on Monday were hectic. A few of the seniors left school and joined the military. On February 19, 1942 the Federal Government declared that anyone of Japanese ancestry would be sent to interment camps for the duration of the war. Friendships were shattered. Students were angry and confused by the removal of the Nisei students. Most felt their fellow classmates were not Japanese enemies, but Americans like themselves. Hope remembers that it seemed as if one day everyone was in class, and the next day all Japanese-Americans had disappeared. Personal items that would have been confiscated by the government were given to student friends who remained--personal items that would be kept safe and returned to their rightful owners after the war.

Graduating in 1942, Bruce and Hope made the difficult decision that marriage would wait until the war was over. After a semester at UCLA, Bruce went to Submarine School in New London, Connecticut, while Hope entered UCLA in the fall and studied Physical Therapy. After an arduous training period, Bruce was assigned to active combat duty aboard the USS Sea Poacher in the Pacific, and Hope was commissioned an Ensign in the Navy and served as a Physical Therapist at a number of naval hospitals across the country.

Hope and Bruce were married in October 1945 at war's end. The pair returned to the Westwood area and became reunited with their childhood friends, and began raising a family. They remained true to their Uni High heritage as all four of their daughters graduated from the high school that had meant so much to Bruce and Hope.

Bruce's successful career as a Mechanical Engineer with several large corporations led him to form his own company, BYCO, in West Los Angeles. With their daughters grown and on their own, Hope returned to a career in physical therapy, visiting her patients in their homes. Trips with friends and church gatherings remained a very strong part of their lives. Both were active in several groups including the Uni High Educational Foundation.

Sadly, in March of this year, Bruce Young passed away. His humor and friendship will certainly be missed by all who knew him. Hope is now living in Dana Point near other family members.

Special recognition was given at the dinner-dance to Ray ANDERSON (Alohan) and Claric CLOCA Thomas (Hybridges) for coming the language distances to attend (from Ex

Gloria GIOGA Thomas (Jubileer) for coming the longest distances to attend (from Fayetteville, Pennsylvania and Ft. Walton Beach, Florida, respectively).



Also at the dinner dance the first ever MKTLP* Award was given to Alohans Larry PORTER, Charlie CORBATO, and Ed ZWIEBACK. After the Alohans 50th reunion 106 classmates were missing.
