NEW FOOTBALL FIELD AND TRACK MOVING FORWARD TO SPRING COMPLETION

Excellent progress is being made on the installation of the new AstroTurf football field and eight-lane, all-weather track at Uni. This L.A. Unified School District (LAUSD) project, being built by Ohno Construction, is expected to be completed in late May.

When completed, several new elements will be added to the complex. One will be a new scoreboard to be mounted on the Westgate Avenue (west side), which will have 23-foot-long panels available for corporate or personal sponsorship. It's not complicated, but – this is LAUSD – there is a process.

In addition, an announcer's booth will be placed on the north side of the field, opposite the stands, allowing accurate statistics to be kept, as well as for public address and press use. This facility is being sponsored by alumnus *Scott Kivel*, who will name it for a revered former Uni administrator at a future ceremony.

Many inquiries have come in concerning the post-renovation impact on the Uni baseball program, which for decades played from the southeast corner of the football field. That will not be possible in the future. In 2015, the baseball team will play its home games at West Los Angeles College.

In view of the LAUSD regulations for baseball and softball, it will be possible to place softball on the football field, as there is no requirement for a permanent outfield fence. Because baseball has this requirement, the plan is to move baseball to the upper field (previously known for many years as the Girl's Field). This will create an excellent location for most purposes, but will create a very short porch in right field, similar (but on a smaller scale) to left field at Boston's famed Fenway Park. The solution will be installation of Uni's own "Blue Monster," a tall fence which will require home runs to reach the wall above a painted line.

SENSATIONAL TURNOUT FOR COACH K'S 90TH BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

A full house of more than 220 alumni, co-coaches and friends came out to salute a very surprised *Dick Kampmann* (yes, he was surprised!) for his 90th birthday on February 7 at Pepperdine University.

Uni alumni dating back to Kampmann's first team in 1960 (!) were on hand to speak, with Western League 880 yards champion *Harvey Stein* getting the biggest roar:

"When I spoke to [Coach K's son] **Bill [Stimming]** a few weeks ago, he said 'This is a roast; I'd like you to roast Coach K.' I'm thinking, 'Roast Coach K? I mean, that's like, roasting Moses! What do you say?"

Kampmann himself took the microphone for a new minutes in the middle of the program to reflect on reaching 90, the event and reflections on the journey:

"You know, it's usually when the kids got tired running or they wanted to rest, they'd say 'Coach, tell us a story,' and that would take another 30-40 minutes and after a period of time, I finally caught on that 'You don't want to hear my story, you just want to sit here and rest.'

"I have been probably, as I guess Lou Gehrig said, the luckiest man on this earth, to have done what I was able to do and to be with the people that came out to me, and you can see that they still carried on and still have thoughts, and I think the memories that they have — that's the reward for me, more than anything else, is that I gave these young people an opportunity to experience a little, miniature part of life and that they had to rely on each other in order to reach an objective.

"I have been very blessed in the fact that I taught at schools that gave me the opportunity to do what I feel I do best, and that is to coach and teach young people how to achieve.

"I can't believe that all you people [can] still stand around, and you must be long-distance runners in order to hang in there that long.

"I normally speak for hours, but I am not going to do it because it's late and I understand that some of you got other appointments, but I want to thank you very, very, very much for

allowing me to coach you as a student, and the parents who turned their young people over to me for a period of time. And as you heard the talk, the kids – they're not kids now – they're all very strong professionals – they got out what athletics is supposed to be for, and that makes me feel good.

"Those are the memories I have and I will carry them with me.

"When I reached 90, I thought, 'hey, maybe I can get to 100.' (cheers) But my role model happened to be a fellow who lived to be 104, in *Jim Pursell*, the former USC and Uni guy. He's been my idol [who] I followed myself [as Uni coach]. And to tell you the kind of person he was, when I was at Dorsey High School, we had a contest against Uni, and they had had a winning streak of, I think it was like 33 or 37 in a row in dual meets, and I took this group of young people, and they had never really won anything, and went over to University High School and we beat 'em, snapping their thing. And the thing that impressed me most was that after the meet was over, I was talking to Jim Pursell and he said, 'Coach, could I get on the bus and talk to your kids for a few minutes?' And I thought, 'Wow, of course you can.'

"And he proceeded to tell my Dorsey kids what a fantastic job they had done in snapping a seven-year streak of whatever [number] it was. And that to me is, I said [to myself], 'That's the kind of coach I want to be. I want to do that.' And that's what I thought.

"Anyway, I thank you and appreciate everything that you have said. And we still may try for 100, but I'm not sure."

Everyone who was in attendance is hoping he does.

• Boys/Basketball: 17-13 overall (5-7 Western League)

The Wildcats finished fourth in the tough Western League with a 5-7 record, a game behind Palisades (6-6). That earned Uni a no. 4 seeding and a first-round bye in the City Division I playoffs (click <u>here</u> for the complete bracket); Steve Ackerman's team will face the winner of Wednesday's game between Kennedy (10-19) and Washington (11-12) in a home game on February 20 at 7 p.m. in the quarterfinals.

Senior 6-1 forward *Cushan Allen* and senior 5-8 guard *Nicholas Brooks* finished the regular season as Uni's top scorers with averages of 18.4 and 11.7 points per game, respectively. Senior forward *Keijon Hickman* led in rebounding at 9.4 a game, while Brooks averaged 2.7 assists a game, just ahead of soph *Rudy Eugenio* at 2.6 a game.

18-9 overall (7-5 Western League)

Uni's fine regular season concluded with three wins in a row and seven in its last nine games to earn third place in the Western League. *Good news*: that earned the Wildcats the final spot in the City Open Division quarterfinals, essentially a no. 8 ranking in the City. *Bad news*: the no. 8 spot means the Wildcats have to face top-seeded Narbonne (21-5 and 7-0 at home) on the road on February 20 at 7 p.m. (*bracket*).

Precious Nwaba, Uni's star 5-9 senior guard, finished the regular season as Uni's top player, averaging 22.4 points, 7.8 rebounds and 4.4 steals per game. Junior 6-4 center *Jada Gambrah* is also averaging in double figures at 12.5 points a game, a team-high 9.7 rebounds and 1.3 blocks.
