"CITY CHARTER HIGH SCHOOL" 9th-GRADERS MAY LAND AT EMERSON FOR A YEAR

▶ Parents and friends of Emerson Middle School – a main feeder school for Uni – have been busy of late opposing the temporary assignment of 125 ninth-grade students from the City Charter High School to the Emerson campus.

Flyers and petitions have been circulated to parents dropping off their children at the school, urging attendance at an informational meeting on May 12 and sending petitions to the Los Angeles Unified School District against the assignment.

Uni principal Eric Davidson explained that the LAUSD is following procedures adopted under California Proposition 39 (passed by voters in 2000), which requires that facilities be made available to eligible public charter schools that serve students who reside in that school district.

In specific, the plan is for 125 ninth graders to be located at Emerson for one academic year (2015-16) until the City Charter H.S. facility at Venice and Motor Avenues (Hamilton H.S. area) is completed.

If all four grades (9-12) of the City Charter High School student body were to be moved permanently to the Emerson campus – now being re-developed for the first time since 1940 – it could be a significant negative for Uni. But the move is proposed only for a year and only

for the 125 ninth-graders. Although Emerson now serves grades 6-8, it was for decades a Junior High School, serving grades 7-9. And there is space available on-campus to support classrooms dedicated to the City Charter ninth-graders; the City Charter students in grades 10-12 would be accommodated elsewhere in the LAUSD.

▶ "Into The Woods" update: Lots of inquiries about Uni's spring performance, and especially about how to get tickets. One typical note: "So we can't buy tickets online? Where on campus is the student store and what hours is it open? What date will they be available?"

All good questions, so here are some answers:

- (1) No ticket sales online yet. Uni Director of Theater Arts Ronnie Sperling '76 is working to get an online sales outlet set up, and we will keep you informed.
- (2) Tickets for all performances are available at the Uni Student Store, open during schools hours: Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. The Student Store is in the Administration Building, on the main floor; you can get directions from the main office near the front entrance at Texas and Westgate Avenues.

Remember, Opening Night is coming on Friday evening, May 8 (7 p.m. curtain), with we'll have more details shortly on a fund-raising Gala to take place beforehand.

▶ Claudia Strock (<u>cjstrock1@gmail.com</u>) writes "I recall reading a couple of years ago that engraved bricks could be ordered for placement in front of the new gym. I'm wondering if that is still on the drawing board, and what the timeframe might be. Thank you."

Principal Eric Davidson informs us that the commemorative bricks program has been delayed due to the continuing construction of the new field, new track and the Collins & Katz Family YMCA. Once these projects have been all or nearly completed, then the bricks can be sold and installed without having to weather more upheaval on the site.

• Girls /Basketball: 21-11 overall (7-5 Western League)

Behind star guard *Precious Nwaba*, Uni completed a wild season as the Los Angeles City Division I Consolation Champions, defeating Granada Hills, Fairfax and Carson to qualify for the California State Division I playoffs! The Wildcats lost to Canyon Springs, 79-51, in the first round of the State tournament to end their season at 21-11.

Nwaba was unstoppable in the playoffs, scoring 39, 40, 34 and 38 points in her final four games. Her 40 points vs. Fairfax came on 13-22 field goals and 11-12 free throws, plus nine rebounds and four steals. She scored 34 against Carson to help Uni overcome a two-point deficit at the end of the third quarter; she made 10-23 field goals and 13-15 free

throws against the Colts, and was helped by senior guard *Lizeth Hernandez's* 15 points and junior forward *Meagan Hall's* seven rebounds.

Even in defeat at Canyon Springs, Nwaba scored 38 points on 15-31 field goals and 7-11 free throws. Junior center *Jada Gambrah* added 10 rebounds.

For the season, Nwaba averaged 24.7 points, 7.8 rebounds and 4.1 steals per game. She was named the Western League's *Player of the Year* and already has two scholarship offers to NCAA Division I universities. We'll keep you posted on where she chooses to go.

Gambrah finished second in scoring on the season at 11.3 points a game, a team-high 9.3 rebounds and 1.2 blocks. Hernandez ended the season at 10.1 points a game, giving Uni three players averaging in double figures. Congratulations to the Wildcats and head coach Ron Cass.
