UNI ONLINE YEARBOOK PROJECT: NEXT UP ARE 1950 AND 1965!

▶ Thanks to everyone who has been checking out the first set of yearbooks now posted at the UHEF.org Web site (click *here*). This project is now getting ready for the second set of yearbooks to be posted.

In response to multiple requests, a process for bringing specific yearbooks online quickly has been created, called "Advanced Publication." For a donation to the UHEF of \$499 (the average cost of digitizing and posting a single yearbook), a specific year can be brought forward in the order and shown online more rapidly than normal.

With scanning of new yearbooks now underway, the next Chieftains to be posted will be 1950 and 1965, thanks to the support of two devoted Uni alumni: *Buddy Fischer* '50 and *Steve Sills* '65.

Uni's Director of Theater Arts, *Ronnie Sperling* '76 notes that "Disney's 'High School Musical' is our most ambitious production to date. Exciting choreography, a large cast, awesome sets, contemporary costumes, some modern lighting, and a surprise appearance by the Uni High Drumline will combine to make this Disney Channel classic come to life on our Stivelman Theater stage."

▶ Uni teacher and librarian *Tascha Folsoi* has been among the leaders on campus in the outreach efforts to receive specific grants to enhance their efforts. Already in 2016, she has received three grants to help Uni:

"This year I received a grant from DonorsChoose for \$500.00. This was used to purchase biblotherapy books, or fiction books showing students dealing with a wide variety of tough emotional and societal issues and coming out stronger on the other end.

"I have also received another grant from DonorsChoose for \$475.00. This grant was used to purchase books featuring Latino characters.

"In addition, I received a grant from the United Talent Agency for 10 Chromebooks [laptop computers] to be used in a silent room off of our otherwise lively library."

Good work, Tascha! We've asked teachers who receive grants to share their successes with us so we can share them with our readers.

▶ Uni teacher *Kerri Eich* has also been active in the grant arena, obtaining significant funding to help support Uni's health and wellness programs:

"[W]e received \$10,000 in funding this [past] Fall from the Designing Futures Foundation arm of HMC Architects to teach Uni families and our local community about Aquaponics, Vermicompost, Power Plant Couples, and Seed to Skillet; focusing on how we can bring food to the front of our integrated daily living to create more sustainable, life-enhancing practices."

Eich notes that "\$5,500 of the funds will be used to develop curriculum and teach eight afterschool workshops for students and families.

"\$4,500 of the funds will be used to bring in EVO Farms experts to provide workshops to train teachers and students in managing and maintaining the nano-farm system."

The concept behind the grants is summarized in this excerpt from Eich's grant proposal:

"One of the biggest problems the world is facing is that people are losing touch of what is natural and healthy. The social, economic and political impact of something as basic as our food source and the conservation of water is something that affects us more each day. It is important to learn about the issues that we are facing and to equip students with not only that awareness, but also give them the tools of how to put it to practice. The students in the School of Health and Environmental Sciences learn about preventative health through sustainable lifestyles. Besides their academic work, the students also care for the school's food forest and cook meals from the fresh produce they have grown. The Board of Education approved a plan last year that emphasizes students planting gardens on school campuses that become 'outdoor classrooms.'

"Goals outcomes and community need:

"As a team we would like to learn how we could equip our students with skills that can significantly change their health, how they feel, and how they live their lives. How do we help establish students' connection to their bodies, food and the environment? How can the students integrate this "connection" into their lifestyle and community? How can we engage students in real-life experiences that enhance their actions toward a healthier lifestyle? In order to answer our questions, our team has set two learning goals for our gardens that will then turn into themes for our curriculum.

"Goal #1: Nutrition and Food Preparation for Preventative Health:

"Some of our students have poor eating habits, which can be directly related to their socio-economic status, the lack of availability of places to buy fresh food in their neighborhoods, and poor family nutritional habits. Many of our students eat high-calorie diets, but are undernourished because they consume nutrient-poor foods. In the short term, this can lead to low energy and fatigue that can affect performance in school and other activities. The long-term effects are many, but two current serious effects for young people are obesity and diabetes. We want to focus our learning on how to prevent disease and other ailments instead of trying to 'fix' them after the fact. Students should not have to feel like their dinner choices are based on which restaurant has the best 'dollar' menu. We want students to walk away from our program with cheap, fast, fresh, and easy meal ideas, along with a better understanding of the body and what it needs to function well. When students learn to integrate healthy, low-cost recipes into their family's meals, it supports healthier eating at home, allowing them to contribute to their family, promoting confidence and self- esteem.

"Goal #2: Gardening and Growing Food for Sustaining Health:

"Our students currently tend to be disconnected from nature, affecting their respect for one another and the space they share in school. The process of growing food provides students with a clear and direct experience around where their food comes from and how their actions affect our world. Gardening is a meaningful experience that connects students to the earth, helping build self-respect and self-reliance. With this place based learning opportunity, students can also better connect to how they fit in and contribute to the greater good of our school. Students will not only get their own 'space' to garden at school, but will go home with many ideas for gardening and growing fresh food in their own spaces, whether small or large. If we can maximize the space we have to grow food and harvest seeds that we can share with others in sustenance kits, we can supporting our larger community in a real and meaningful way. Our students need more opportunities for experiences beyond the classroom that are positive and engaging, that empower them to make healthy changes in their lives in-turn encouraging changes in their families and communities. We feel our garden program will be a fun, hands-on way to provide this opportunity!

▶ Visual Arts department chair *Lynn Ishii* reports that senior *Alex Kim* placed fourth in the Visual Arts (photography) category in the Rotary International District 5280 "Pageant of the Arts" contest held on March 5.

"This is the first time in any category that a Uni student has placed at the district level," said Ishii. Although Kim did not win one of the cash prizes distributed to the first three place winners, his Honorable Mention finish is a Uni first!

- ▶ Amazing to remember the costs of buildings in Los Angeles when the city was in one of its growth phases. From the *Pacific Coast Architectural Database*, the history of the original school district project that became University High School:
 - Designers: Russell and Alpaugh, Architects (firm); Norman Walton Alpaugh (architect); Clarence H. Russell (architect).
 - Dates: Constructed 1923-1924.

Los Angeles architectural firm of Russell and Alpaugh drew up plans for the \$350,000 high school that contained an auditorium, gym, cafeteria, industrial arts room, and 24 classrooms in 07/1923.

The name was changed from Warren G. Harding High School to University High School just after the University of California, Los Angeles Campus moved to Westwood from East Hollywood in 1927-1929. By 1929, Warren Harding's name had been discredited by Teapot Dome and other scandals during his administration. He was not seen as a proper role model for young people by this time. According to the high school's web site, the name "University" was selected "... because it became a site where teachers-in-training from nearby UCLA worked as assistant teachers."

Early notices referred to the high school as the "Sawtelle High School." Two stories high, the brick school shared its Italian Romanesque styling with nearby UCLA which was being planned at about the same time.

The school's auditorium and gymnasium were condemned and torn down following damage caused by the 2/09/1971 Sylmar Earthquake. A gymnasium was reconstructed in the early 1980s. In c. 2010, the Music Building and West Gymnasium were also to be demolished because they rested directly on a fault line, which violated building codes for schools.

Uni's original plan included the Administration Building, auditorium and gymnasium along Westgate Avenue and the fields and springs which extended to Barrington Avenue. The Classroom Building was added much later, along with countless bungalows.

The original auditorium was red-tagged and closed soon after the Sylmar earthquake. The original gymnasium stood until 1978 or so, with a new facility rebuilt on the same site. The current gym, on the south side of campus, opened in 2011.
