COMMENCEMENT REMARKS FROM PRINCIPAL ERIC DAVIDSON

Uni principal *Eric Davidson* delivered two addresses to the Class of 2017, one for the seniors only and public remarks at the Commencement Ceremonies in Kampmann Stadium on June 9. He was kind enough to share both with us:

To the graduating seniors:

"Good afternoon. To the parents of our graduating seniors, congratulations for surviving the uncertainties, anxieties, and chaos of being the parent of a teenager. To the families of the class of 2017, I hope you are as proud of the accomplishments to come as you are of the achievements of today. To the friends of this class, I hope you remain steadfast in your friendship and are reminded each and every day of the best qualities of these fine folk. To the class of 2017, I hope you leave here having learned what it is to be kind, generous, and caring adults who are

destined to be the greatest of all generations knowing that anything less may not be enough. We truly count on you to be the solvers of great equations that have no limits nor bounds; to be inspired by the extraordinary qualities of being human; to be fearless in the face of complexity and to be resolved to persevere to a solution that may save our Mother Earth from the short-sighted decisions of our politicians.

"Remember that when you walk down the street, no one knows your GPA or your SAT score. They don't know how many hours of community service you have served. People can't tell what your accomplishments are. They can't tell if you graduated from high school or even what high school you attended. People only know what they see. They can see your smile. They can see your kindness towards a stranger. They can see the way you dress or how wear your hair. You communicate with actions more than words, so take actions that make a positive statement about who you are and the way you are.

"I graduated from a high school not far from here. I got older, married, and started my own family. My kids ended up attending the same high school. I became the Assistant Principal at the high school. One day I received a call from a community member. She shared this story with me:

"I take walks every day. I time my walks so I'm not on the street when the high school lets out because the students make me nervous. They're loud and walk in big groups. They seem to take over the sidewalk leaving little room for anyone else. Well, yesterday when I was walking, I saw a large group of students walking towards me. School must have let out earlier than usual. I didn't know what to do, so I froze in the middle of the sidewalk. One of the students approached me and told the other kids to make way. She took hold of my arm and helped me through the crowd. She asked me how I was doing and commented on what a great day it was for a walk. We finally got through the crowd of kids who smiled at me and made me feel at ease. I thanked the young lady who escorted me. She said, 'You're welcome.' Then she turned and walked away to catch up to her friends.'

"The community member who called was my mother. To this day, she always tells me that story as if it was the most important event in her life. You can make that same impact on the life of a total stranger. You just have to give yourself the chance.

"Give yourself a chance to be better. Give yourself a chance to lend a hand, help someone in need, give something of yourself that another might need more. Do what is right rather than what is popular.

"Work hard at doing better. It is our nature to find the easy way. We are creative and innovative. But it is important to work hard using our creativity and innovativeness. Taking the easy way solely to minimize effort is a path with few benefits. I was a line cook and became the head chef. I pumped gas and became a mechanic. I was a sales associate and became a department manager. I was a bouncer and became a general manager. I was a teacher and became a principal. I worked hard at doing better. That's my story, what will yours be?

"Finally, find your passion. Working for money is a job. Working for salary is a career.

Working for the work is passion. I have found passion in this place because the work includes being with you. Being with you feeds my hungry heart. Being with you satiates my soul. Being with you gives me purpose to do this work. My hope for all of you is to work hard, do better and find your passion.

"There are an infinite number of things that can happen between now and the known end of your life's journey. Each minute of every day gives you a chance to decide. So, be wise, choose well, and unto yourself be true."

To those gathered for Commencement:

"Welcome University High School family members. Your family is our family. Our family stands together. We stand for tolerance, acceptance, and respect. We respect our brothers and sisters. We honor our parents and kin. We celebrate our differences and, most importantly, we trust the commitments we make to each other.

"Our Declaration of Independence has endowed us with unalienable rights. Included are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Our ancestors give us life, our rule of law gives us liberty but our happiness is limited only by our imagination, creativity, and the choices we make.

"We have a chance to explore and discover. Don't settle for the first shiny thing you find. It is always amazing and inspiring. But it is the first. What else may come our way? Maybe the wiser path makes us look outside our comfort zone. Perhaps you go away to school or transfer from a community college. We expand our minds by experiencing things that make us feel unsure, insecure, and awkward, only to be liberated. Imagination is so important.

- "John Lennon: 'Reality leaves a lot to the imagination.'
- "Albert Einstein: 'The true sign of intelligence is not knowledge but imagination.'
- "Mark Twain: You can't depend on your eyes when your imagination is out of focus."
- "Walt Disney: 'When you're curious, you find lots of interesting things to do.'

"Courage keeps us on our path. Without courage, we defer responsibility to others. Courage is not the same as fear. Courage is taking a step towards fear. Courage isn't a fight. Courage is moving forward even when confronted with obstacles and barriers.

- "Winston Churchill: 'Success is not final, failure is not fatal: it is the courage to continue that counts.'
- "e. e. cummings: 'It takes courage to grow up and become who you really are.'
- "Plato: 'Courage is knowing what not to fear.'

"This last quote is very important because we are more and more told what and who to fear

and why. That takes me back to the beginning of this talk. Our differences make us better. When I look at all of you, I know that I am loved as much as I love. That I am cared for as much as I care for this mighty institution. We are all parts of this whole and it will take our imagination and courage to fight the forces that are driven to divide us, make us separate and unequal, challenge our better sense of who we are as people and humans, and limit our collective liberty and our happiness.

"Today we celebrate and I implore you to continue celebrating the diversity of us, the strength of our unity, and the remarkable imagination and courage each of us has because we are home here with our family."

► Mark Cantor '67 (<u>markcantor@aol.com</u>) shared some memories of his time at Uni and especially of the late Principal (in '67, Administrative Assistant), Jack Moskowitz:

"Before retirement I had a 40-year career in education (early childhood), the right fit for me, and a career in which I garnered a fair share of awards and recognition. I was interviewed when I retired and mentioned that there were many teachers, elementary through high school, who influenced me a great deal. At Uni there was Mrs. Jorgenson, Mr. Karlsrud, Mr. Queen, Mr. Kampmann, Mr./Dr. Steinberg and (for other reasons, mostly the growing awareness of eye candy) Miss Sullivan. Ironically, I said there was one teacher whose behavior was such that I patterned myself to behave in an opposite way and that was Mr. Moskowitz. From Mr. M. I learned that sarcasm, embarrassment and put-downs had no place in the classroom. That being 50 years in the past, I will sign off and get ready for the Dodger game."

- ▶ *Dave Dutra* '71 (<u>Davedutra@msn.com</u>) wrote with condolences and memories of the late coach and physical education department chair, *Duane LaRue*:
 - "Coach LaRue was an athletic driver and a coaching machine. He coached me in '69, '70, '71 right into the 'Optimist Bowl,' the East-West All star game at the L.A. Coliseum in '71. I still hear his whistle driving us headlong into the blocking sled and his voice yelling 'NOSE ON THE NUMBERS.' He loved it when I came to practice with a missing tooth from a bicycle accident over the weekend. Then when I came in with a Mohawk haircut he sat me down in his office and cleaned it up a bit so I could be a respectable Warrior athlete. From a paddle to the stomach for wearing a grey instead of a white t-shirt, to a triumphant yell and multiple playbacks of a smashing pass-protection block on a charging linebacker in Monday's films of Friday's game, Coach LaRue along with Coach Sedia shaped me into a blocking/tackling machine. So long Coach."

Good idea, Rick! Not sure about changing the masthead, but the four plaques which are now proudly posted on the South Gym are shown on the following pages.




"Coach K" University High School, 1960-85

Beloved teacher and the most successful coach in Uni history. His teams won eight All-City Championships in Cross Country (7:1974, 1975 and 1980 varsity boys; 1981 junior varsity boys; 1977 10th grade boys; 1979 and 1985 girls) and Track & Field (1: 1970 boys), 24 All-City individual titles, 77 Western League team championships, 252 Western League individual titles and 875 dual meet victories. Taught his students and athletes how to win, in competition and in life. Renovated Uni field and track facility named in his honor in 2015.

PATTON TRACK



Mel Patton "The World's Fastest Man" University High School, 1941-43

The set school records under Coach Jim Pursell in the 100-yard (9.8) and 220-yard (21.5) dashes that lasted 32 and 34 years. A five-time NCAA champion at USC, "Pell Mel" went on to set world records in both the 100 and 220 from 1947-49 and won gold medals in the 200 m and 4x100 m at the 1948 Olympic Games in London, the only gold medals ever won by a Uni athlete. Later became a collegiate coach and had a long career in the electronics industry before passing away in 2014 at the age of 89.

Angus Cavanaugh
Principal
Harding/University High School, 1924-35

I naugural principal at Warren G. Harding High School in the fall of 1924, later to become University High School in July, 1929 in honor of the move by UCLA from downtown to Westwood. In 1925, he wrote of the new school's students: "The boys and girls here today are Pioneers in the westward growth of a great city and in the establishing of a new school. The opportunity is yours to leave to the boys and girls who follow, a heritage worthy of you." In gratitude for his leadership, the Uni football field was named in his honor.
