MAJOR GIFT FROM LANCE & STEPHEN ROBBINS TO CREATE NEW WARRIORS & WILDCATS STRENGTH & CONDITIONING CENTER

The purpose of the Uni Hi Education Foundation is to raise funds to support University High School beyond what is provided by the Los Angeles Unified School District. The newest example is the creation of the Warriors and Wildcats Strength and Conditioning Center, made possible by *The Lance Robbins Family*, including Uni alumni *Lance Robbins* '65 and brother *Stephen Robbins* '62.

The new facility will replace and expand the current weight-training room in the South Gym with world-class equipment from top-flight manufacturers including Life Fitness, Hammer, Rogue and ViPR Pro.

Each item will be specially identified and painted in Uni's royal blue and persimmon colors and the weight-training area will be expanded into an indoor/outdoor complex with video instruction capabilities. Veteran Uni coach *Ryan Ritcheske* will supervise instruction and use of the Center, with an emphasis on promoting safe strength and conditioning through state-of-the-art resiliency and performance training techniques. In addition, a new Sports Medicine program is being planned to begin in the fall semester.

Lance Robbins explained his family's gift as a legacy of his Uni experience. "My time at Uni shaped my view of the world and set me on my life's path, and my football coach, **Duane** LaRue was a big part of that.

"I learned a lot about diversity and how to interact with my peers. I learned to work hard, to deal with pain and never quit. To this day those lessons give me strength during trying times, both physically and mentally. I have lifted weights since I was 13 years old and have continued it all the way through to today. I credit it for a great many things, but I also suffered injury from the exercises I was taught because we didn't know any better then. We do now. I owe a lot to the community of University High School and I want to pass that forward to today's families."

Lance was honored as a member of the All-City football team as a strong and undersized lineman, and then played at UCLA, from which he graduated in 1969. After graduating, he earned a Juris Doctor degree at the University of California's Boalt Hall, practiced real estate law and then started what is now a nationally-recognized real estate development company specializing in recycling inner-city historic buildings into art, music and residential centers nationwide.

His belief in mentorship and life transformation led to volunteer addiction counseling for 13 years, endowing the first academic chair at Berkeley's Law School addressing destructive drug policies and supporting social and medical research in the potential of cannabis treatment. The strength, determination and inclusiveness learned at Uni drives him to this day. He continues to welcome inquiries and opportunities to mentor at his Web site *Urbansmartgrowthllc.com* for those seeking a way forward.

The Robbins Family's major gift was added to by the UHEF to complete the indoor/outdoor aspects of the facility. The total cost of the new equipment, installation and complementary technology infrastructure will surpass \$80,000.

The installation is already underway and will continue through the summer. The new WARRIORS AND WILDCATS STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING CENTER will be in use by Uni's sports teams this fall.

UNI HONORED AS A NATIONAL SILVER MEDALIST HIGH SCHOOL

▶ The high-profile "Best High Schools" list compiled annually by *U.S. News & World Report* for 2018 identifies about 6,000 schools from among 20,000 surveyed nationally as "Gold," "Silver" or "Bronze" medal winners.

Uni joined the list of medal winners this year, as noted by the Associated Administrators of Los Angeles (AALA) <u>newsletter for June 18, 2018</u>:

"Congratulations to the LAUSD schools included in <u>U.S. News and World Report's</u> 2018 Best High Schools. The periodical reviewed data from more than 20,000 high schools across the country and ranked nearly 6,000 as gold, silver, or bronze. Out of the 247 high schools in the District, 108 (includes affiliated and nonaffiliated charters) received gold, silver, or bronze medals. Listed on the next two pages are the 64 regular and affiliated charter high schools that received this recognition. The selection was based on each school's reading and math scores overall; the reading and math scores of disadvantaged students; graduation rates; and students' preparation for college-level coursework as shown by participation in AP or [International Baccalaureate] programs."

Uni was one of those schools, receiving silver-medal recognition and ranked by USN&WR as no. 328 in California and a national ranking of 1,730.

The honor is especially remarkable given Uni's student make-up and funding available from the District. Congratulations to the administration, faculty, staff and – of course – Uni's students.

THANKS AND FAREWELL FROM RETIRING UNI PRINCIPAL ERIC DAVIDSON

Uni's 16th principal, *Eric Davidson*, retired at the end of the school year, completing a remarkable 10-year run at Uni that began in the Fall of 2008.

To say his tenure has been one of achievement would be an understatement. Consider the academic standing at Uni at the end of the 2007-08 school year prior to his arrival and the situation at the end of the 2015-16 school year, the last for which LAUSD School Report Cards are available:

Davidson also supervised rejuvenation of the Uni campus, including extensive use of classroom computers, construction of the South Gym after the second gym on Westgate Avenue was condemned, renovation of Stivelman Theater, installation of the new Astroturf field and running track now called Kampmann Stadium and Patton Track and the construction of the Collins & Katz Family YMCA on Uni grounds at the corner of Ohio and Westgate Avenues.

Moreover, Davidson saw the danger of falling enrollment at Uni – caused by the lack of attendance from school-age children from the local area – and helped to create the new Affiliated Charter at Uni which was approved on June 5, will become effective in July and be implemented in the new school year.

We asked him for some parting comments to the Uni community and he responded thus:

"After spending 10 years leading University High School, I have determined the 'why' of my career path. From classroom teacher, to program coordinator, to District management, to school administrator, there has been no experience that I hold in my heart and memory more tightly than the one I had being the Principal of our wonderful school. I have been inspired by students, parents, teachers and community members. I have come to know people who share the memories of our school with fondness and love. The alumni have connected the past to the future by sharing the values of our history that remains constant to this day - Community, Diversity and Excellence. Whether Warriors or Wildcats, we will always be Unified by our common experience rather than our uncommon backgrounds. Len Hill, class of 1965, exemplifies this connection.

"In the Spring of 2013, Len visited the school in preparation for his class reunion. We walked the campus together and came across a young man named David. David is an exceptional person and had been accepted into Harvard, Yale, and Washington University, St. Louis. He wanted to go to Yale but the financial conditions were less than satisfactory. Len would have nothing to do with that, considering he graduated a Warrior and Eli, and set forth on a crusade. Needless to say, David recently completed a B.S. degree in Mechanical Engineering at Yale University, and is a researcher and engineer focused on sustainably designed mechanical and infrastructural systems. He understands that nothing is designed in a vacuum, even for space.

"Len capably articulated his vision and support of public education. It is because of Len, **Kathleen Cohen, Scott Kivel, Steven Sills**, and so many other amazing alumni, I am able to say, with great certainty, that alumni make the difference. I will not be Principal, but will continue to support Uni because that is what Warriors and Wildcats do.

"I appreciate your years of support and thank **Rich Perelman**, as the writer and editor of this publication, for doing his part in support of this worthy and just cause.

"Lastly, I want to thank Judy Wolfenstein, Ivan Finkle, Jeff Deckman, Randy Awni, Janet Hirsch, Mike Cockinos, Mike Johnson, Joan Kline Redlich, and all the other University Education Foundation Board members for their spirited advocacy of the school.

"I am retiring, but am not yet retired. Like many of you, I will keep on doing because I can and hopefully one day soon, we will see one another again.

CLAUDIA MIDDLETON RETURNS TO UNI AS ITS 17th PRINCIPAL

A familiar face will be in the Principal's Office at Uni this fall to replace the retiring *Eric Davidson*. It's *Claudia Middleton*, who was a teacher assistant at Uni in 1993 and was most recently the Principal for two years at Whitman Continuation High School on the Fairfax High campus.

The selection process was quite lengthy, with the Los Angeles Unified School District setting up a search committee that included four teachers, four parents, a non-teaching staff member and a student. Six candidates were interviewed and a recommendation was forwarded to LAUSD Local District West Superintendent *Cheryl Hildreth* for final selection. She agreed with the preference expressed by the committee and Middleton will become Uni's 17th school chief.

After starting as Uni, Middleton obtained her teaching credential in Biology and taught at Los Angeles High School. She eventually became the English Learner Program Coordinator there and had an opportunity to return to Uni as Instructional Specialist for the 2015-16 school year. However, the District's personnel rules made it advantageous for her to transfer to Hamilton High School to become Assistant Principal there for half a year, before taking charge at Whitman Continuation High School.

She'll be the third female principal at Uni and third in the last four. All the best, Claudia, for a great tenure at Uni!

COMMENCEMENT 2018: UNI GRADUATES ITS 93rd CLASS

Beginning with the Class of 1926, Uni has seen its graduates move on from the high school ranks with pride in their achievements, both at the school and in the future. So it was on

June 7, when the Class of 2018 was recognized at Kampmann Stadium and saluted by Uni principal *Eric Davidson*:

"Class of 2018, Parents, friends, and my esteemed colleagues:

"Most of these speeches can go on longer than they should. Especially when there are 380 or so graduates waiting to walk this stage. That doesn't include the thousands of families and friends, alumni and faculty, and others, who have not come here to listen to me talk, but rather to celebrate the students who have earned the right to have their name announced in front of all of us here.

"But I ask for indulgence here. I will not presume to advise you on your life ahead. Nor will I suggest the "right" road for you to choose, whether the one less traveled or the one that suits your shoes. I can only share my personal narrative because that is the one I know best.

"It starts with Mark Twain: The two most important days in your life are the day you are born and the day you find out why.

"I was born long enough ago to be considered old now. I ended up in Los Angeles the summer of 1974 and graduated a year later from Westchester High School. I had been born but hadn't found out why.

"I went to Loyola Marymount University out of convenience to my parents. My father was the Dean of Fine and Communication Arts and he didn't have to pay tuition. I lived at home. I worked lots of jobs while going to LMU. I was a chef, mechanic, machinist, Men's furnishing's manager, and sold linens. I was a bouncer, a bar back, and a bartender. In every job, I ended up in management because I was willing to do the hard work and because people didn't mind working for me. But I was just breathing in the air. I spent ten years trying to find my why without success. I just kept looking.

"I found myself in a classroom as a substitute teacher. I was doing something I swore I would never do ... be an educator like my dad. I also found something that made me curious. I started to like getting up in the morning. I liked getting ready to go and change the smallest part of the world - my classroom. It was fun, and I was still curious. I wondered how I might increase the size of my classroom. I left the classroom and became a coordinator. Then moved to a District office. But my classroom wasn't in a school anymore. I needed to get back to school.

"I lived in Westchester. My kids were going to Westchester. I had graduated from Westchester. I became an Assistant Principal at Westchester High School. I thought it was perfect and for four years it was. I thought I had found my why, then I applied for this job, not because I wanted it, but because I wanted the experience. Guess what?

"I love this job. This is my why. This is what I was meant to do, and I only want to do this job the best I can. I love this job because of the ones sitting here, the ones sitting there, and the ones who couldn't get a seat in here. I also love the ones who aren't here, like **Olga [Kokino]**, **Violetta [Ponce]**, and **Gabriel [Orozco]**.

"I love this job because it gives me a chance to make better the lives of my students and to give hope: Hope to those who have experienced the trauma of life without asking, to those who have lost more than their fair share, and mostly to those who are unjustly held captive by a society that is as ruthless as it is kind. I love this job because we are responsible for sustaining a democracy whose rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness can fade out of existence, but whose dreams can never be restricted or legislated against. I love this job because regardless of right and wrong, good and bad, black and brown, rich and poor, we have the duty to love each other as Americans and not question the loyalty that is owed to each citizen. Finally, I love this job because my classroom is just the right size - to hold all of you and the 18,000 other Wildcats who have passed through our halls these past ten years.

"As I told you the other day, a laugh is a cure for most of the things that ail you and love is answer to most of life's riddles. Laugh hard and love long.

"Finally, I want to share the words of **Maya Angelou**:"I've learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel."

"I feel more than I can describe. Thank you and good luck."
